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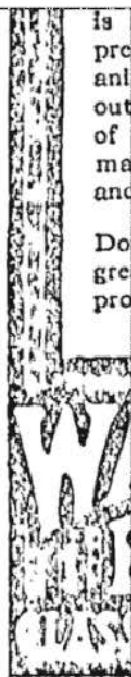

SCIENCE SNIPS

A new chemical combination has been discovered that produces greater heat than any hitherto known, according to announcement by Dr. Irving Langmuir of the General Electric Co. This is through a process of burning hydrogen in an atmosphere of hydrogen. In the oxyhydrogen blowpipe commonly used for welding or the linelight, two atoms of hydrogen united with one atom of oxygen to form a molecule of water. In the new Langmuir blowpipe two atoms of hydrogen simply unite with each other to form a molecule of hydrogen.

MURDERS TO GET FORMULA

[By International News Service]

NEW YORK — Belief that the international importance of a secret formula for the treatment of copper, recently discovered, led to the poison murder of a watchman at the Guggenheim Laboratories here today was expressed by officials of the laboratory with the finding of the guard's body in a chemically laden room.

The murder was committed in one of the most diabolical methods on record, a throwback to the mediaeval crimes of the Borgias. Potassium cyanide, a

poison resulting in almost instant death, was placed in the coffee of Arthur Gow, watchman.

Gow's body was found in the Guggenheim Laboratories by employees reporting for work today. Nearby, two other men, who had been slugged with a revolver, were bound and gagged. They are Wilmer Mayhew and Chester McCauley, both of Baltimore.

The pair, who had driven a truck load of tear gas from the Southern Motor Corporation plant in Baltimore, surprised a lone bandit who was rifling the laboratory after killing Gow.
